Transport

The **shuttle bus** will leave from *Odense Theater*, Jernbanegade 21, and will arrive at SDU, P1 bus stop. From P1 our student helpers will show you how to reach the conference venue.

University smoking policy


Smoking is prohibited in any indoor area of the university. Smoking is prohibited outdoors, whenever it causes an inconvenience to employees of the university, students or the public.




The hallmarks of the SDU are the quality of our research, our strong regional links, our international outlook and, not least, the thousands of ambitious and committed students and staff working here.



ODENSE CITY

Odense is the third-largest city in Denmark. It has a population af around 175.000 people, and is the main city of the island of Funen, which is placed in the middle of Denmark. By road, Odense is located 144km to the southeast of Aarhus, and 167km to the southwest of Copenhagen.

Odense has close associations with Hans Christian Andersen, who is remembered above all for his fairy tales. He was born in the city in 1805 and spent his childhood here. It is thought his birthplace is the small yellow house on the corner of Hans Jensens Stræde and Bangs Boder in the old town. In 1908 the house was opened as the Hans Christian Andersen Museum. It documents his life from his childhood years as the son of a struggling shoemaker, to his schooling, career as an author, and later life, with artefacts providing an insight into his acquaintances and adventures. Andersen's childhood home is on Munkemøllestræde not far from the cathedral. He lived in the little half-timbered house from the age of two until he was 14. Opened as a museum in 1930, the house contains an exhibition of the cobbling tools used by his father and other items based on Andersen's own descriptions.

Throughout the city there are numerous statues and sculptures representing characters from the stories of Hans Christian Andersen. They include the Steadfast Tin Soldier, the Mermaid, the Shepherdess and the Chimney Sweep, the Toad, the Darning Needle, the Emperor's New Clothes, the Sea Horse, the Paper Boat, the Flying Trunk and the Wild Swans. There is also a distinctive statue of Andersen in Eventyrparken (The Fairy Tale Park) beside the cathedral. Sculpted by Louis Hasselriis in 1888, it

shows the storyteller with a book in his hand, ready to entertain onlookers with his fairy tales

The city is home to Odense Palace which was erected by Frederick IV, who died there in 1730. Now an administrative building, it stands on the site of Sankt Hans Kloster, a 15th-century monastery which was transferred to the Crown in 1536

It is also home to Odense Theater which was first established in 1796, and is Denmark's second oldest theatrical enterprice and one of the country's three main theatres. The original building was on Sortebrødre Torv was used until 1914 when a new building designed by Jacobsen was opened on Jernbanegade. It has three stages. The theatre also has stages in the former sugar factory "Sukkerkogeriet".

Odense is the commercial hub of Funen, and has a notable shopping district with a diversity of stores. The *Rosengårdscentret* shopping centre is located in the south-eastern part of Odensen. The centre dates from 1971 and is the second largest in Denmark with 100.000m².

Tourism is an important source of income for the city. In 2011, Odense ZOO was Funen's most popular turist attraction and the eleventh most popular in denmark with 405.913 visitors. The zoo was founded in 1930 and covers an area of 8.9 acres and has roughly 2.000 animals, covering 147 species. In 2001, Odense ZOO inaugurated a DKK 60 mio. "Oceanium" featuring South American animal life.

Department of Business and Economics

The Department of Business and Economics has a strong tradition for high-quality research and teaching within the fields of economics and business. This is demonstrated through numerous publications in leading international journals, as well as through the education of highly valued candidates at the Bachelor, Master, and PhD level.

The research and teaching activities at the department are organized within three groups:

- Accounting and Finance
- Macroeconomics, Trade, Economic History, and Econometrics
- Microeconomics and Management Science

The research covers both theoretical and empirical subjects, but the use of economic theory and quantitative methods such as mathematics, statistics, econometrics and computer science characterizes most research projects.

The department has three cross-disciplinary focus areas: Accounting and Finance, Economic Development under the programme Historical Economics and Development Group (HEDG), and health economics. The latter is organized in the Centre of Health Economics Research (COHERE) – which comprises researchers from both the Faculty of Health and the Faculty of Business and Social Sciences.

The main study programmes at the department are: BSc and MSc in Economics (oecon.); BSc and MSc in Economics and Business Administration (HA and cand. merc.); BSc and MSc in Mathematics and Economics (scient.oecon.); and MSc in Business Administration and Auditing (cand.merc.aud.).

Approximately 70 people from 15 different countries currently work at the department plus a number of external teachers.
