- Explanation of the coalition formation simulation.

Session 9: Debrief, Discussion and Conclusion (15 minutes)

- Reflection on the coalition formation exercise.
- Discussion of challenges, compromises, and strategies.
- Recap of key takeaways from the workshop

Sessions 6 and 8: Simulation: Forming Coalition Governments (55 minutes)

Objective: In this simulation exercise, students will take on the roles of different political parties and work together to form coalition governments. They will apply their knowledge of political parties, party systems, and the impact of globalization on party dynamics to navigate the complexities of coalition politics.

Simulation Setup:

- 1. **Fictional Country:** The workshop will introduce a fictional country, Genovia, with a unique political landscape, including the number of seats in the parliament, recent election results, and key issues facing the country.
- 2. **Role Assignment:** Participants will be divided into groups, with each group representing a different fictional political party. Each party will have a specific history, ideology, and policy priorities.

Simulation Steps:

- 1. **Initial Party Positions (5-10 minutes):** Each group will familiarize itself with its party's platform, ideology, and policy priorities. They will also assess their party's relative strength based on recent election results.
- 2. **Negotiation** (**35-40 minutes**): Groups will engage in negotiations with other parties to form coalition governments. They will need to consider their policy goals, potential partners, and the minimum number of seats required for a majority.
- 3. **Coalition Building (10 minutes):** Once negotiations are complete, groups will formally announce their coalitions and present the agreed-upon policy platform.

Facilitator's Role:

- Facilitators will guide and moderate the negotiations, ensuring that students consider various factors like policy alignment, party strength, and potential compromises.
- They will encourage critical thinking and discussion among participants.

Learning Outcomes:

- Understanding the complexities of coalition politics.
- Appreciating the importance of compromise and negotiation in forming governments.
- Applying knowledge of political parties and party systems in a practical context.
- Analyzing the impact of different factors on coalition success.

This simulation exercise will provide students with a hands-on experience of the challenges and decision-making processes involved in forming coalition governments, allowing them to apply the concepts learned during the workshop and gain a deeper understanding of the dynamics of modern democracies.
